“Birthplaces of Berthier & Clerc” & “Deaf Movement”

On Saturday, February 7, 2004, Patti Raswant gave an all-day informative presentation “Birthplaces of Berthier and Clerc” and “Deaf Movement” to the VASLTA members at NVRC. She made a trip to France last July to give her lecture “The Mutes of Istanbul’s Topapi Palace” at the Deaf History Conference in Paris and seized an opportunity to make a side trip to the birthplaces of Ferdinand Berthier in Louhans and Laurent Clerc in La Grottes Des Balmes. Louhans and La Grottes Des Balmes are about 200 miles north-west of Monaco and Nice in southern France.

She showed the slide pictures of her visit to both birthplaces and mentioned that there was a play presented by deaf French players who portrayed Clerc and his family members in La Grottes Des Balmes before the deaf visitors of different countries that attended the Paris Conference. The LaGrottes Des Balmes mayor welcomed the international deaf visitors for the rededication of Clerc’s childhood house. La Grottes Des Balmes visitor’s center has a full display on Clerc’s life in its second floor.

According to Van Cleve’s Deaf History Unveiled, “Deaf Banquet and the birth of Deaf Movement” written by Mottez illustrated that Berthier’s early attempt to prevent the spread of oral teaching methods to schools for the deaf in France was by inviting educated deaf men and hearing politicians, well-known figures, and journalists to the annual Deaf Banquet in the hope the hearing guests would become their allies. Although Victor Hugo was invited, he could not come due to family illness, he wrote a supportive letter. Mottez listed the deaf

Americans who attended the Deaf Banquet were John Carlin, H. H. Moore, Douglas Tilden and Grenville Redmond. The Deaf Banquets succeeded in exposing the signing deaf leaders from various parts of the world and their talents for 70 years (1830s-1900s) until they were defeated by the Milan Conference’s Manifesto against signing education for the deaf children.

Patti explained that Berthier was considered as the Father of all deaf associations which led the way to the establishment of deaf associations around the world.

Berthier also worked hard to improve legal rights for deaf French and he was the first deaf of birth ever to receive a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor in 1849 from Napoleon III. The emperor intended membership in the Legion of Honor to be a distinction of such illustriousness that would fire people’s imagination, valor and be held in high esteem.

Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet asked Clerc to emigrate to America to establish the first school for the deaf in Hartford, Connecticut in 1817. Patti believes that through the introductions from Clerc, the deaf Americans created connections with deaf French which enabled them to improve education for deaf children as well as the formation of deaf associations in America.

At the end of the educational presentation, many good questions were asked. Some of the attendees shared their experiences in traveling in France.

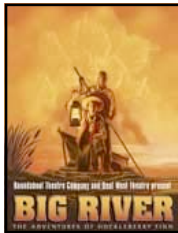

Description and Qualifications:

The Instructional Services Department is seeking qualified individuals to teach American Sign Language.

The candidate must have graduated from an approved teacher preparation program in American Sign Language, completed a major in American Sign Language, or completed 24 semester hours above the intermediate level in American Sign Language. The program shall include courses in advanced grammar and syntax, conversation, culture, and a minimum of three semester hours of methods of teaching foreign languages at the elementary and secondary levels.

Native users or candidates who have learned

American Sign Language without formal academic credit in a college or university must complete the following requirements:

- (1) Competency in American Sign Language demonstrated by written documentation of one of the following:
 - (a) Hold a current, valid qualified or professional certification by the American Sign Language Teachers Association;
 - (b) Hold a current, valid Virginia Quality Assurance Screening Level III Interpreting or higher issued by the Virginia Department for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing;
 - (c) Hold a current, valid Registry of Interpreters for Deaf certification in at least one of the following: Certificate of Interpretation (CI), Certificate of Deaf Interpretation (CDI), Reverse Skills Certification (RSC), or Comprehensive Skills Certificate (CSC);
 - (d) Hold a current, valid National Association for the Deaf Level IV or higher certification.
- (2) Earned a minimum of 3 semester hours of methods of teaching foreign languages at the elementary and secondary levels from an accredited college or university in the United States.

"FACE-PAINTING" with Non-Manual Signals in ASL

Non-manual signals (NMS) in American Sign Language enrich and clarify the meaning of manual signs. Come and learn that art of painting your face with a full spectrum of NMS colors and designs.

Non-Manual Signals include: 1) Non-Manual Adverbs 2) Lexical Non-Manual Behaviors 3) Non-Manual Grammatical Markers 4) Emotional States / Evaluative judgments 5) Prosodic Structure 6) Discourse Structure 7) Turn Taking 8) Backchannel Feedback 9) Grammatical "Sound" Markers, and 10) Mouth Movements.

This workshop will focus on developing accurate non-manual signals and markers as used in ASL. Demonstrations of each category of facial behaviors and head movements will be shown in context. Practice exercises will be offered. By the end of this workshop, you'll be an artist!

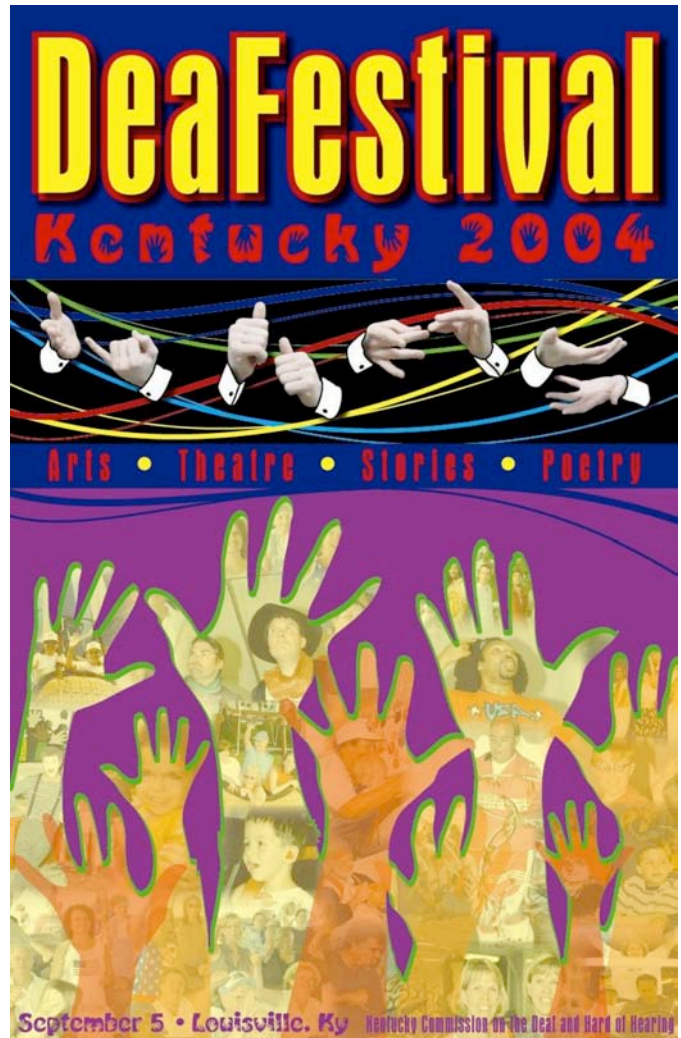
