VASLTA will be offering workshops in the future to help our members achieve this goal.

I look forward to working with all of you during the next few years to improve and increase VASLTA's membership!

Black Deaf History



Carolyn McCaskill-Henry presented a workshop on "Black Deaf History" on February 01. She covered: historical overview, segregated Schools for the Color Deaf and Blind, the Black Deaf Community, Black Deaf Culture, Identities issue, Ebonics, Black Sign Language, and notable Black/African Deaf Americans.

She said that the National Center for Health Statistics produced a 1994 report giving an estimate of 240,000 deaf Black people who were about 5 percent of deaf Americans.

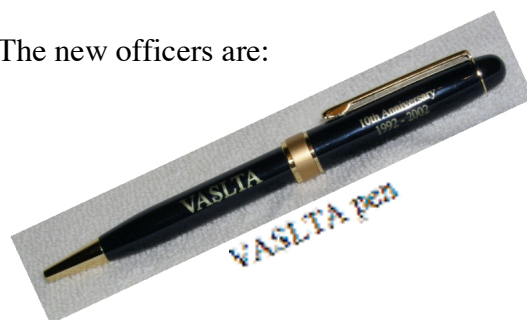

ASLTA Conference in Indianapolis

The conference started on Friday morning for Adele Polk and me, because we flew in the night before. We attended the keynote address. The keynote speaker, Tom Holcomb, talked about “Speeding to a New Definition for Deaf Culture.” He said that the traditional definition of Deaf Culture included core values such as Gallaudet, Deaf schools, ASL, Deaf clubs, and Deaf parents. He felt that the new definition of Deaf Culture should include core values such as Deaf Pride/Full Acceptance, Sign Language/ASL, Self Determination/Independence, and Proper Perspective on: speech, Deaf schools, and ASL.

The plenary session on “A Report from the National ASLTA-CIT Task Force” explained about how Conference of Interpreter Trainers (CIT) and ASLTA had a lot in common and could benefit from working together. The goals were to: identify ways of Deaf ASLTA members’ involvement in the field, explore ways of raising standards, and make recommendations about financial and organizational management.

Several workshops I attended were:

Arkady Belozovsky’s workshop was on “Learning Foreign, Linguistically-Related Sign Languages: What are the Benefits to ASL/Deaf Studies Instructors?” He shared his experiences in learning Japanese Sign Language and how it gave him the idea to present Russian Sign Language.

Eileen Forstal gave a workshop on “Implications of Teaching Prosody in ASL.” Her definition of prosody was -- “combination of features in any language that produces rhythm, accent, and ‘feel’ of the language.” She gave ideas of how to foster it from day one in the classroom.

Jason Zinza gave two workshops. One was on “High School ASL: Fun and Games or a Real Language.” By using the term “activity” we indicate that ASL is a serious language. The other was on “Moving Beyond ‘It Looks Right’: Tests & Evaluating ASL.” He shared his review of assessment models and showed how to design and use rubrics. Jason has a book called “Master ASL” coming out in January 2004.

Nina Coyer and MJ Herrema Olson presented a workshop on “Coordinating Sign Language Lab Activities with ASL Classes.” They used technology to develop materials and activities.

Adele Polk’s workshop was on “Practical Survival Tips for ASL Teachers.” She gave emphasis on networking, relationships with peers, working with high school students, and dealing with Bureaucracy.

Alysse Rasmussen provided a workshop on “Games and Activities for the ASL Classroom.” She used them to lower stress, provide more practice, teach ASL grammar, and foster teamwork.

Matthew Moore moderated a group session for ASL teachers on “To Teach or Not to Teach? Is ASL teaching a charitable activity or a means of survival?” Participants were given the opportunity to bring up issues related to teaching ASL.

Elizabeth Lucey presented a workshop on “OPPRESS-ME-FINISH: Combating Audism in ASL Classrooms.” She provided strategies on how to combat audism in ASL courses.

Adele's first job was at Boston School for the Deaf in Massachusetts, teaching Reading and sign language to students, faculty and staff since the school was in the process of changing from Oralism to Total Communication.

She worked at Perkins School for the Blind in the Deaf/Blind Department for 2 1/2 years before switching over to work at Red Acre Farm Hearing Dog Center (RAF). She worked at RAF for 8 years and left to come down to Virginia in 1991. During that time, she taught sign language for local adult education classes.

Adele worked at NVRC for two years, and then went to Gallaudet University to teach in the English Department for 3 years. She also began teaching ASL at NVCC in 1993.

She set up a business with a friend and worked as a consultant and ASL teacher for local, state and Federal government agencies. She started working as an ASL teacher at Woodbridge Senior High School in the Fall of 1999 and is now finishing her 4th year there.

Adele is currently waiting to hear on her Provisional Certification from ASLTA. She is married with one child. She enjoys reading, watching captioned movies and playing with her daughter, Fiona.

One of her goals with VASLTA is to set up a strong group of high school ASL teachers who can meet and share ideas with each other on a regular basis.

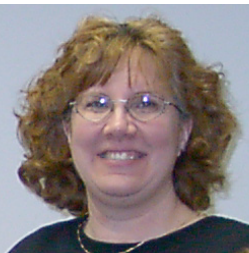


**Treasurer

She is an ASL Teacher at West Springfield High School. Her favorite hobbies are swimming, reading, writing, and signing music.

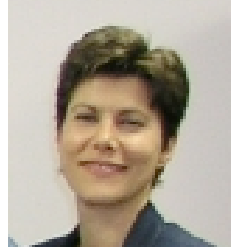


**Member-At-Large
